Evolution Mining is listed on the Australian Stock Exchange and is the second largest listed gold mining company in Australia. The company reports its results on a financial year basis, with the full-year results for the 2025 financial year released in August each year.

The 2025 financial year was an excellent one for Evolution, with a number of records achieved across the business including at Northparkes Operations.

Northparkes achieved record annual operating cash flow of \$299 million and net mine cash flow of \$108 million. These results were driven by record production, with 49,044 ounces of gold and 28,485 tonnes of copper produced during the year. The site also achieved significant cost efficiencies.

## E48 development and exploration progress

The development of a new mining area, known as the E48 Sub-Level Cave (SLC), was our focus for the first half of the year. This development involves drilling, blasting, and establishing ground support for the tunnels required to access the ore body, before production begins.

In August, we began production of the E48 SLC. Sub-level caving involves drilling and blasting the ore to break it down, which is then extracted using loaders and trucked to the underground crusher.

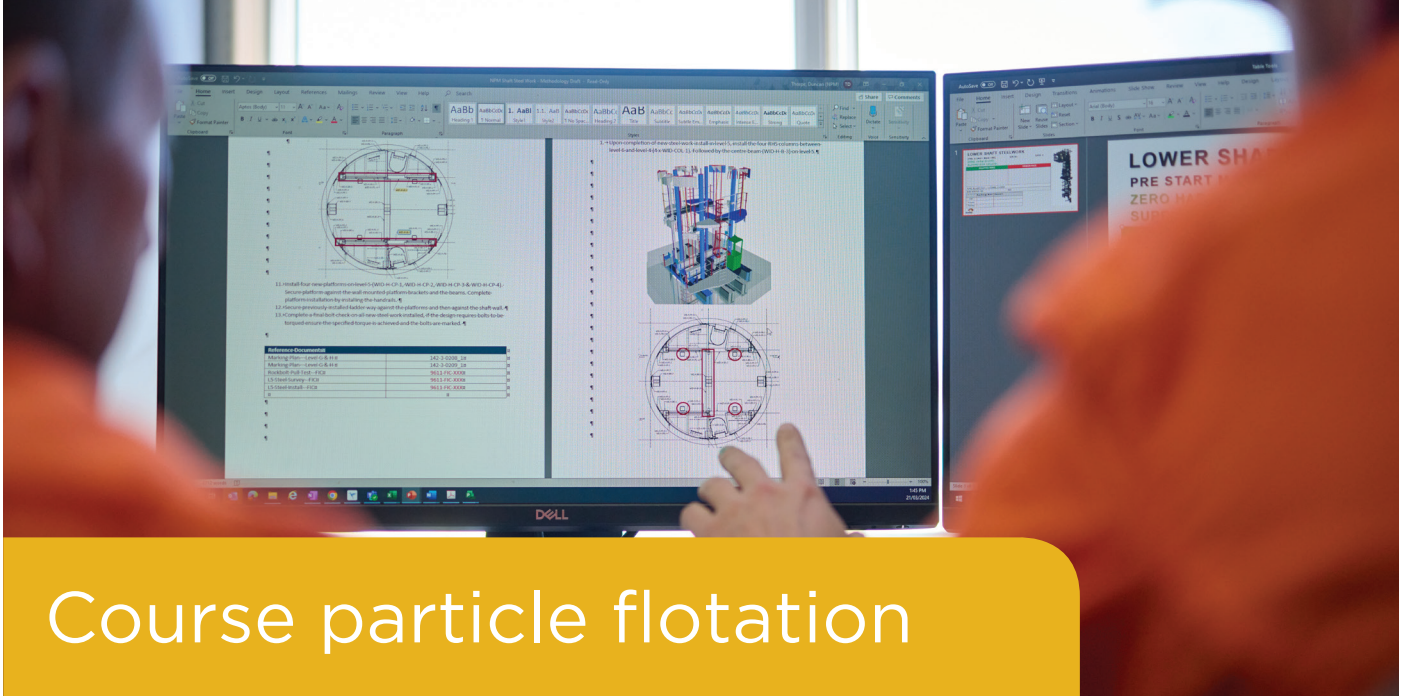
Excitingly, the increase in mining activity has created a number of new operator roles. It has also been a great opportunity for us to increase our diversity, with candidates who are new to the mining industry.

The future of mining at Northparkes looks positive, with extensive exploration drilling underway on prospects; Major Tom and E51.

Once drilling finishes on these two prospects, we will begin modelling the area to assess whether open-pit mining is a viable option. Looking ahead, exploration will focus on several promising areas along the same geological contact as E51 and Major Tom that have yet to be tested.

## Course particle flotation

One of our Evolution values is excellence, and we're always looking for ways to improve our processes and be more efficient. One example of this is to find ways to recover more of the valuable minerals from our ore. The Projects team is doing a feasibility study into Coarse Particle Flotation (CPF). This is a new processing method that recovers more minerals from ore particles larger than those that conventional flotation can handle.

Our existing flotation circuit requires material to be ground very finely to separate the minerals from the waste. CPF will allow us to float and recover coarser particles resulting in higher overall metal recovery from the same volume of ore.

Other benefits include less grinding, lower energy use, and improved circuit efficiency. By reducing the need for fine grinding, CPF would significantly cut energy usage compared to traditional methods. This makes it a more sustainable approach, helping to lower both operating costs and environmental impacts.

The feasibility study is nearly complete. The next step will be getting approval from the Evolution Mining Board before progressing to the execution stage. If approved, this would be the first CPF circuit implemented at an Evolution mine site. Only three other hard rock mines in the world have fully operational CPF installations.



## Scholarship spotlight

We've presented our 2025 Indigenous Scholarships to three excellent recipients, Ellynia Redfern, Lara Bennett, and Kaitlyn Spence.

These scholarships were created nearly 15 years ago to support Wiradjuri students at university, and so far, we have provided over \$350,000 in financial support to very deserving people.

"It's not just about the money, it's about the independence this scholarship gives me,"

said one of the 2025 Indigenous Scholarship recipients, Lara Bennett. "I feel so lucky to have been given this opportunity. My family was not in a position to help me financially, so studying a university degree may not have been a possibility for me without the scholarship," she said.

## Flipping the script

When the Heart of Parkes opened its doors earlier this year, it marked the beginning of a long-term investment into the future of healthcare in our region.

Through a partnership between Evolution Mining and Charles Sturt University (CSU) School of Rural Medicine, the facility now provides a home base for 12 medical students. They are gaining hands-on experience in a real clinical setting, while staying connected to the community many of them hope to serve in the future.

CSU recently received accreditation to deliver its own medical program and curriculum. For the past three years, the program operated from a small office at Parkes Hospital, making the move to this purpose-built facility a major step forward.

Local GP and program mentor, Dr Kerrie Stewart, said the new space has been transformative.

“The Evolution team has delivered this incredible facility that provides the opportunity to improve access to health services in our community.”

“There’s a simulation lab, a beautifully equipped tutorial teaching space, and consulting rooms. They’re set up for clinical consulting, which means we can start to deliver training that’s more community-based,” she said.

The Heart of Parkes also provides a space for collaboration across local health services. Students learn alongside experienced professionals while helping to deliver holistic care to the community.

“This is a neutral space, in the political sphere of health, for us to bring other health professionals on site to share education, information and local data,” said Dr Stewart.

For fifth-year medical student Miranda Eyb, the opportunity to study in Parkes is a chance to build her career in the place she calls home. After completing her studies, she’ll spend two years working as a junior doctor in Dubbo before returning to Parkes as a fully qualified GP.

Miranda said studying locally has allowed her to stay close to her family and continue running her small business, opportunities she wouldn’t have had if she’d needed to relocate. She also believes her training in Parkes has given her more practical experiences that few city students receive.

“One of the best learning experiences I’ve had is with a very skilled regional GP who has been out here for 20 years. When I do placement, I get my own room and see my own patients. I want to be a GP, and the thought of coming back to Parkes and giving that same development to students is really exciting. This facility is the perfect setup for that.”

Miranda believes that the new facility is helping to re-write the narrative that there aren’t opportunities for rural medical students.

“Whenever there’s something happening that we can learn from, we don’t have to elbow others out of the way. It’s just us and the doctor. In many ways, we receive more training,” she said.

As the Heart of Parkes continues to grow, so too does its impact. It will strengthen the region’s healthcare workforce, build collaboration across disciplines, and ensure the next generation of doctors can live, learn and work locally.





# \$192,807 raised for local charities

When staff from the Central West Ronald McDonald House (CWRMH) learned they would receive half of the profits from the 2025 Frontline Services Ball, their response was simple: humbled and excited.

“The support received from the Parkes and Forbes communities is both amazing and so very generous,” said Executive Officer, Rebecca Walsh.

For families with seriously ill or injured children, Ronald McDonald House is much more than a place to stay—it’s a vital service that offers stability, compassion, and practical support in some of life’s most difficult moments.



This donation will help CWRMH continue to provide free accommodation to families who need to be close to hospitals and care. “On average, it costs us around \$190 per night to provide support for a family. This donation will go a long way in helping us sustain that care and expand our services to more families in need.”

Another specific area this funding will support is the expansion of the Hospitality Cart Program. This program delivers toiletries, snacks, toys, and comfort items directly to the bedsides of children in hospitals, as well as items for

babies and their families in the special care nursery. Operating in Dubbo only, the aim is to expand this program into Orange and Bathurst hospitals.

“Families come to us during some of the most stressful times in their lives. Being able to wrap support around them, that goes beyond just a roof over their heads is so important.”

The other half of profits from the 2025 Frontline Services Ball will make a meaningful difference to the work of Birds in the Bush, dedicated to addressing domestic and family violence in the Central West.

The funding will support the Bird Brains Program delivered in Parkes and Forbes. The program includes student seminars, tailored learning modules, and staff training sessions. All have been designed to be culturally safe, locally relevant, and based on local needs.

Unlike one-off awareness talks, Bird Brains is structured to build lasting impact through ongoing, age-appropriate education. It empowers young people to understand what respectful relationships look like, recognise coercive or controlling behaviour, and encourages them to speak up when something doesn’t feel right.

“This program isn’t just education – it’s prevention. It gives students the tools, confidence and language to challenge harmful norms and build healthier relationships from the start,” said President of Birds in the Bush, Vanessa Vazquez.

“Domestic and family violence rates in regional NSW remain significantly higher than the state average, and teachers are seeing

the effects play out in schools every day. One teacher shared how they see students normalise harmful behaviours like location tracking or social media control, without recognising them as early signs of abuse.”

Once this program begins, the aim is to reach hundreds of students, train school staff, and co-design modules with input from local communities. With longer-term support, the hope is it will be delivered annually to reinforce learning and adapt to the changing challenges students face.

“Education is one of our most powerful tools to prevent domestic abuse. Thank you for helping us bring that power to Birds in the Bush. Together, we can lead lasting change starting from the bush, for the bush,” Vanessa said.

In total, the three balls have raised over \$360,000 for local charities in the Central West. An incredible \$192,807 was raised at this year’s ball held on Saturday 30 August. Evolution Mining Northparkes Operations was the major sponsor of the event. Thank you to all the local businesses and community members who support this event.

# Partnerships for progress

We are proud to announce a five-year partnership with Parkes PCYC to support an Aboriginal Youth Mentor (AYM) role. This role will support Aboriginal children, young people, and families across the community by providing a culturally safe point of connection, guidance and support.

Peak Hill local, Torin Hando, will start in the Aboriginal Youth Mentor role in November.

“Growing up here, I’ve seen how important it is for our young people to have someone they can relate to and trust,” Torin said.

“I’ve faced the same barriers these kids are facing, and I want to create a space where they feel proud of who they are and supported as they grow.”

In his new role, Torin will run sessions at the PCYC, organise events to showcase and celebrate Aboriginal culture, help link participants to services, and be a positive role model and mentor for the community.

Manager of the PCYC Parkes Branch, Kim Hando, says this partnership helps to bridge a gap between local youth and essential services.

“The Aboriginal Youth Mentor will be present in places in the community that we’ve previously

been unable to tap into due to funding shortfalls,” she said.

“The partnership gives us the ability to identify young people who need assistance and put the frameworks in place to help them. The AYM will be walking alongside kids on their journey both in school and through events like Nations of Origin, so they will be best placed to support them.”

Nations of Origin is a tournament that unites Indigenous and non-Indigenous young people to celebrate culture through sport. Participants must maintain at least 80% school attendance, ensuring a commitment to education while fostering personal growth and a deeper connection to their cultural heritage.

This year, 44 children took part in the program, 30 of which were Indigenous. This is an increase of 41% from 2024. Kim is confident that the new role will continue to expand outreach to support the success of this program, creating pathways for further opportunities in sport and community engagement.

“We need to be in schools and in the community having these important conversations, and we wouldn’t be able to without the support we get from Northparkes, our major sponsor of this event for the next three years,” Kim said.

Nearly 60 employees have participated in the program this year alone, with more eager to take part during planned shutdowns.
