## Celebrating 20 Years of Cowal: A Milestone Marked with Community and Commitment

Cowal Gold Operations recently celebrated a major milestone — 20 years of successful operations — with a series of events that honoured the people, partnerships, progress and communities that have made Cowal a cornerstone of gold mining in New South Wales.



### A Legacy of Gold and Growth

Since commencing operations in 2005, Cowal has poured over five million ounces of gold, firmly establishing itself as one of the state's leading gold operations. Under Evolution Mining's ownership since 2015, Cowal has continued to thrive — producing 2.6 million ounces in the past decade alone, while investing significantly into the region through wages, procurement, and partnerships.

To formally commemorate the 20-year milestone, Cowal hosted an onsite ceremony attended by key stakeholders, including the NSW Minister for Natural Resources, The Hon. Courtney Houssos, MLC, who unveiled a commemorative plaque and praised Cowal's enduring impact on regional communities.

"For 20 years, Cowal Gold Operations has been a cornerstone of the West Wyalong region — driving local employment, supporting community programs, and contributing billions of dollars in royalties and regional procurement," said Minister Houssos.

"Evolution Mining's success at Cowal is a powerful reminder of what can be achieved when industry, government and communities work together."



Guests also heard from Evolution Mining leaders, including Managing Director and CEO Lawrie Conway and Cowal General Manager Joe Mammen, who acknowledged the site's strong operational performance, long-standing community ties, and future potential, with the mine's life extended to 2042 thanks to the Open Pit Continuation Project.

The event included a Welcome to Country by Marion Packham of the Wiradjuri Condobolin Corporation, supported by her son Errol, a Cowal trainee — reflecting Cowal's deepening commitment to Indigenous engagement and local workforce development.

### A Festival of Community and Connection

20-year celebrations continued at the 2025 Evolution Mining Hearts of Gold Festival — a vibrant, three-day community event in West Wyalong that drew thousands from across the Central West.

Highlights included:

- The Golden Gala Dinner at the Regal Estate vineyard, attended by approximately 40 of Cowal's team members.
- A Brunch & Browse market day including Open Day at Cowal's town office, offering behind-the-scenes insight, giveaways, and interactive activities for the community.

- Family Fun Night, which brought together more than 4,000 people for fireworks, food trucks, rides, and live music — capped off by a headline performance from Furnace and the Fundamentals.
- A Family Colour Run and barbecue breakfast on Sunday morning, ending the weekend on a high note.

### Looking Ahead

With approximately 65% of Cowal's workforce living locally within the Bland, Forbes, and Lachlan shires, and more than \$326 million paid in royalties since opening, Cowal continues to be a significant economic and social contributor to the Central West.

The 20-year milestone was not just a celebration of the past, but a powerful reminder of Cowal's future — one built on sustainable development, strong community ties, and a commitment to responsible mining.

Thank you to all employees, partners, community members, and government representatives who helped make the celebrations so memorable.

# Investing in the community

Cowal has spent over \$400 Million across regional vendors and salaries in the last three financial years.

In August, Cowal released its annual contributions to the region of over \$2M in direct community contributions across the Bland, Lachlan and Forbes Shires in FY25.

Every year Cowal aims to invest in and partner with our communities to achieve meaningful outcomes and generate shared value. We have numerous programs in place to support local organisations, many of which are longstanding.

In FY25, we have spent over \$200M across regional vendors and salaries. Our community contributions included:

**33**  **organisations**

received funding through the Cowal Partnering Program across the areas of youth, education, safety, economic development, environment and Indigenous opportunities.

**28**  **local & regional events**

supported by way of funding and volunteer support.

**14**  **students**

received Wiradjuri Scholarships.

**7**  **organisations**

received funding through the Cowal Cares Program - an internal volunteering initiative.

**2**  **organisations**

benefited from Shared Value Project funding.

**Endeavour Scholarships**

extended to students at West Wyalong High School, Condobolin High School, Forbes High School and Red Bend College.

In addition to the above contributions, Cowal hosted numerous internal events throughout the year which saw an additional \$130,000 of spend with local and regional businesses.

With approximately 65% of our workforce residing locally, there is also indirect spend across the region.

Our community is central to who we are and how we operate, and we appreciate the opportunity to be part of our thriving region and look forward to seeing ongoing local benefits.

- Welcome to Country and cultural reflections by Marion Packham, WCC's Wiradjuri

language teacher, and her son Errol, a Processing Trainee at Cowal, who performed Welcome to Country in Wiradjuri and English.

- Dynamic performances by the Gilari Girls Dance Group.
- An address from WCC CEO, Ally Coe.
- A collaborative and interactive art experience led by Elder Bev Coe, with employees contributing their handprints to a custom artwork created for the occasion.

Cowal General Manager Joe Mammen reflected: "Celebrating 50 years of NAIDOC Week with the Wiradjuri community reminds us of the deep connections we share and the importance of acknowledging the strength, vision, and legacy of Indigenous Australians. We are proud to stand alongside our Indigenous partners and continue fostering opportunities that empower the next generation."

Joe also highlighted Cowal's ongoing commitment to supporting Indigenous communities: "We are proud to employ a workforce where 7.5% identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, reflecting our dedication to creating opportunities for Indigenous Peoples across the region."

The celebration concluded with the Gilari Girls Dance Group touring the mining pit, gaining insight into the diverse career opportunities available in mining.



## From cow paddock to open pit continuation:

Cowal through the eyes of our longest employee



As we continue our celebration of 20 years of operations, we sat down with one of Cowal's longest serving employee - Stephen Casey, Open Pit Continuation Project supervisor - to capture the memories and changes he has observed at Cowal Gold Operations over the years.

Stephen joined in 2002 as a field assistant as part of the exploration team for the Cowal Gold Project, before the mining lease was granted.

"We had upwards of 13 drill rigs over what is now the E42 pit. It just looked like a cow paddock, fenced off with string lines. We had to chase cows off the exploration lease every second or third day."

Originally from New Zealand, Stephen worked around Australia before getting married and having their first child and settling in West Wyalong in 1998.

"Despite the five-year plan changing drastically, I've been very happy. West Wyalong and the mine site have been really good to my children, who are both in their twenties now."

Starting as a field assistant, Stephen has held various roles in the Geology team and is now a supervisor for the civil team for Cowal's Open Pit Continuation project.

Stephen says the diversity and opportunity to partake in projects not exclusive to geology work has been some of his best memories over the years. A typical day never really existed.

"And it's why I'm enjoying my job now because I'm doing so many different things. To see it go from when I originally helped set up, to now I'm helping set up the site's next chapter, to me, it's quite exciting."

This ongoing action around site has been what's kept Stephen at Cowal all this time, particularly since Evolution Mining acquired the asset in 2015 and invested in its organic growth.

"All of a sudden, you had people talking about future. Evolution has come in, and they've just looked at the future and pushed to make that future happen."

But Stephen acknowledged that a large part of his career satisfaction at Cowal has stemmed from living his own advice: "Don't sit back. Take the opportunities as they come, and advocate for ones you're interested in."

"And that's the beauty of Cowal: they try to accommodate your personal development."

In his spare time, now that weekends no longer revolve around kids' sport, Stephen enjoys fishing and gardening or reading some crime fiction.

# Open Pit Continuation update

Since the full approval for the Open Pit Continuation (OPC) project in April, the team has been hard at work delivering across multiple scopes.

Our construction partner has now mobilised on site, completing major works on the rock groyne and sheet pile wall.

These works have involved:

- Installing 6 km of silt curtain
- Placing 97,000 m<sup>3</sup> of chemically tested rockfill — enough to fill 39 Olympic pools
- Installing 25,000 m<sup>2</sup> of sheet piles — twice the size of Ron Crowe Oval.

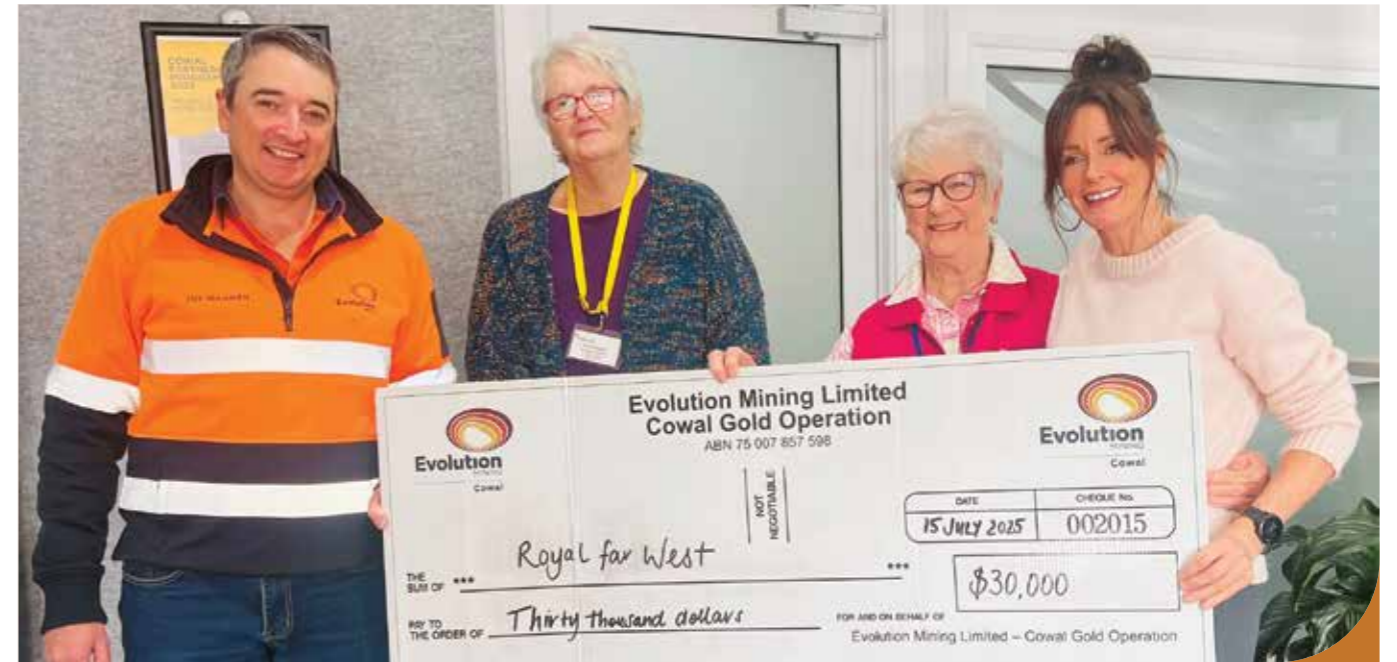
With the bund now watertight, our Sustainability Team has led an industry-best dewatering program in collaboration with the EPA and Fisheries NSW, including:

- Engaging a leading contractor to ensure full EPA compliance.
- Removing over 7 tonnes of European carp (which are considered a pest in Australia) for processing into liquid fertiliser.
- Returning native fish species into Lake Cowal.
- Operating a treatment plant capable of safely releasing 700 L/s back to the lake system.

Beyond the lake works, the OPC team has been progressing across several fronts:

- Habitat salvage, with hollow-bearing trees retained for reuse.
- Topsoil and subsoil recovery for future rehabilitation.
- Construction of a new 500 ML water dam, supporting the mine's long-term water management.

These works represent significant progress toward delivering the Open Pit Continuation safely, sustainably, and on schedule.



## Giving back: Cowal Fundraising Committee donates \$90,000 to local charities

Demonstrating ongoing support for the local community, our Cowal team recently presented \$90,000 in donations to three local charities at their annual cheque presentation event.

The funds were raised by the employee volunteer-led Cowal Fundraising Committee, who organised that purchases from onsite vending machines would be donated to Country Hope, Can Assist, and Royal Far West.

These charities were specifically chosen by the Fundraising Committee for the work they do in assisting local families through some of their most challenging periods.

To round out the sum, Evolution Mining supplied additional funds, meaning each charity received \$30,000.

Representatives from each organisation joined employees for the presentation of the cheques, followed by a morning tea.

General Manager Cowal Gold Operations Joe Mammen shared heartfelt gratitude to the attendees on their work they do in the Central West community.

"The volunteering and services you provide are vital," he said. "Especially in rural areas where access to treatment and support can be challenging. We are proud to play a part in making that support more accessible."

A huge thank you to everyone who showcased their deep care for our local community by purchasing from the vending machines or volunteering on the Fundraising Committee.
